Buffalo, Missouri: "Our bulk seed program was designed to get as much work done on the ground as we can, working with our chapters, members and partners to do so, and we are proud to report it has exceeded all expectations," declares Craig Alderman, Director of Quail and Upland Wildlife Federation, Inc (QUWF). Craig continued, "Turning-The-Dirt"™ is not only our focus, it is our battle cry, we are in this to affect habitat first and foremost through and with our chapters and partners."

"In 2010, year to date, QUWF has shipped approximately \$359,000 worth of seed for conservation uses, seed that under conservation rates has been or will be planted on over 13,000 acres of land, and we are still coordinating more," emphasizes Craig. Each bag of seed and acre of land prepared for wildlife can affect anywhere from 10 to 40 acres of surrounding habitat depending on the upland species. This indicates the bulk seed program affects from 130,000 to 520,000 acres of habitat thanks to the members and partners of QUWF. Seed has been delivered by QUWF to 9 states including wheat, milo, forage sorghum, corn and soybeans.

The QUWF bulk seed program is a direct method for impacting game and non-game species with exceptional resources, which is truly reflected in the results. QUWF continues to implement programs that make a difference for wildlife one acre at a time from California to North Carolina.

QUWF has also listed suggested seeding rates for conservation uses on its web site at www.quwf.net and encourages all landowners to check with local sources for recommended seeding rates in their area which may differ slightly. "Our chapters and members are busting soil for wildlife and it shows in our chapter habitat reports, this is and will impact wildlife populations because it improves habitat in a big way," says Nick Prough, QUWF Regional Director and wildlife biologist.
